- Sydney Morning Herald Archives 1955 – 1995

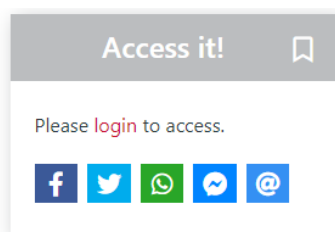

Logging in

You need to log in via our catalogue in order to access the newspapers. Search the catalogue for Sydney Morning Herald Library or Sydney Morning Herald Archives depending on which date you wish to search. You can also use these links:

You will need to login on the right side of the screen.



It will ask you for your Liverpool City Library ID (from your card, starting with 2000, or if you signed up online, your member number starting with C).

Your borrower ID is the barcode from your library card.

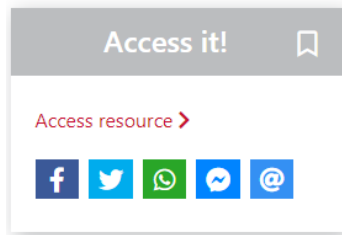

Once you are logged in, the box on the right will change to Access resource. Click on it to be taken into the resource.



Browsing

Both resources have the same functions. When it first opens, it will offer the issues held in January of the most recent year.



You can adjust the date using the year slider at the top, or the months on the right. Once you've found the date you are looking for, just click on the front cover.

You can either select the page you'd like to read or scroll through using your mouse or the left and right arrows. The plus and minus signs adjust the zoom.



You can also click on articles to zoom into that place on the page.



In the top right corner, you can also click on Sections to find a list of sections in the issue, and clicking on one will take you straight to that section.

Thumbnails opens a grid of each page in the issue, providing a small icon.

The last three icons allow you to print, email, or pin the menu options to the screen.

Searching

It is also possible to search for a topic or keyword. In the top right corner, change from Browse if you are on the home page or Viewer if you've been reading an issue, to Search.



On the left side of the screen, add whichever search terms you need, limit by date if necessary, and press Search.

NOTABLE QUOTES


A plea from America's infectious diseases expert Dr Anthony Fauci for people to "wear a mask" to slow the spread of the coronavirus tops a Yale Law School librarian's list of the most notable quotes of 2020. The list assembled by Fred Shapiro, an associate director at the **library**, is an annual update to *The Yale Book of Quotations*, which was first published in 2006. Shapiro says he picks quotes that are not necessarily admirable or eloquent, but rather because they are famous or particularly revealing of the spirit of the times.

From the left to right, the icons can help with additional features:

- Star: Add to my collection
- Printer: Print article
- Letter: Email article
- Link: Copy link to the article
- Arrows: Switch between results
- Little A: Make text size smaller
- Large A: Make text size larger
- Page: Take you to the whole page of the article
- Image: Change to a replica of the original article
- Close: Return to results list

In the top right corner, click on My Collection to find all articles you have saved. This has all the same functions as the result list.
