Any activities will score you at the bottom, but you'll be given chances to fix any that you get wrong.

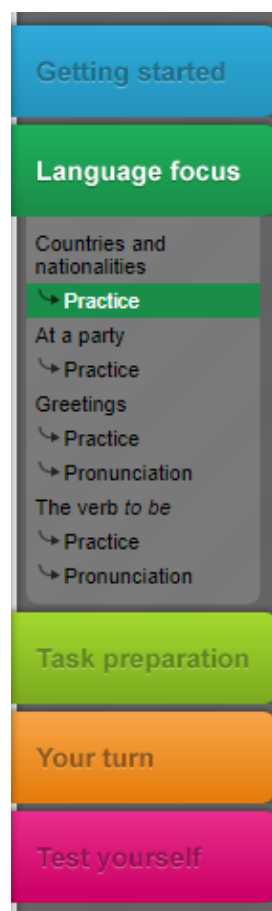

Why has Andrew come to see Dr Cooper? To find out, watch the beginning of the consultation.

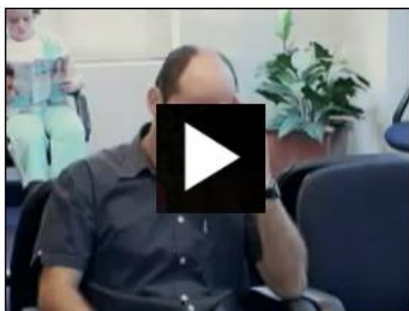
As you listen, also consider these questions:
